Student Contest on SOLIDARITY

With the support of the **Europe for Citizens Programme**, the [Trans European Policy Studies Association \(TEPSA\)](#) is organising a **student contest** on the theme of “**solidarity in the EU**”, open to **high-school, undergraduate and graduate** students from the TEPSA network and beyond.

Why solidarity?

What is solidarity about? How should it be defined? What concrete forms of solidarity can be put in place between EU citizens and between EU member states? What could/should be the role of the European Union in fostering solidarity?

These are crucial questions in the debate on the future of the European Union. For this reason, TEPSA has decided to contribute to this debate and to give the possibility to young Europeans to let their voice be heard and share their ideas and thoughts on this important theme.

What is the contest about?

The contest is open to **high-school¹, undergraduate** and **graduate** students from the TEPSA members and beyond:

- Interested **Master students** have to submit a **short policy brief (2-3 pages)**, reflecting on the theme of **solidarity in the EU**. The policy brief should contain concrete recommendations to policymakers in the specific policy area chosen (see below). View [our guidelines](#) for more information.
- Interested **Bachelor and high-school students** have to submit a **short essay (3-5 pages)** on the same theme.

Students should provide an **original definition** of solidarity and **choose a specific policy area** where to apply it.

Some **examples of topics are provided below** – however, students are not bound to these proposals and new ideas and topics are welcome:

- ✓ Migration to the EU: solidarity as the way forward?
- ✓ Economic divide between Southern and Northern Europe: can solidarity help overcome it?
- ✓ Clashes between Western and Eastern Member States: how to reconcile different interests and goals?
- ✓ Cities and countryside: do the EU townfolk forget on villagers?
- ✓ Climate change and environment protection: ensuring intergenerational solidarity

- ✓ EU enlargement and relations with the neighbouring countries: solidarity beyond the EU borders?
- ✓ EU defence and new security threats: is solidarity among the Member States the solution?
- ✓ Hot to build an innovative and technologically advanced Europe? More solidarity of knowledge?

The best papers will be **published** by TEPSA and **three winning authors** (one in each category: high-school, undergraduate, graduate) will be invited to participate free of charge in one of TEPSA's **EU@Work seminars** taking place in Brussels in November/December 2018, with **travel and accommodation costs covered**.

EU@Work seminars are **4-day seminars on EU affairs**, gathering diverse groups of young Europeans and providing them with first-hand insights on the functioning of the EU through lectures by leading experts and visits to EU institutions.

The **EU@Work Seminar for undergraduate students** will provide participants with in-depth and hands-on knowledge of the EU institutional architecture and policy making and will involve study visits to the main EU institutions and other Brussels-based organisations.

The **EU@Work Seminar for postgraduate students** will focus on the **EU's migration and asylum policies** and will provide participants with insights from academics, practitioners, EU officials and civil society representatives. It will involve study visits to the main EU institutions and other Brussels-based organisations.

The paper should be submitted no **later than 30 September 2018 (midnight)** to **natalia.martin@tepsa.eu**, with "*Student contest_LAST NAME*" as the subject of the email.
